Will of John Hacker, husbandman, of Churchill, 1612

In the name of god amen I John Hacker of Churchhill in the countie of Oxon
 husbandman beinge sicke in bodie but of goode and p[er]fitte reme[m]berance
 god be thankd for it I Doe make ^{this my} Last will ^{and testament} the xxjth day of march in the
 yeare of o[ur] Lord god on[e] thousand six hundred and eleven first I give
 and bequeath my soull to all mightie god whoe hath created me and
 my bodie to t[he] earth to be buried in the Church yeard of Churchill aforesaide
 Item I Doe give unto Thomas ^{Hacker} my eldest Son[ne] twentie pound of curant
 English monye to be payd unto him at the end of twellve monthes after my
 years to be delivered to his use at t[he] age of xxjth
 Death; Lickwise ^{I to give} unto him t[he] cooberd in the hawle the malt mill and the sesto[rne]
 Item I Doe give unto Dorothie my Daugter Twentie pounds of good English mony
 at t[he] end of twoe yeaes after my Deceasse It[em] I give ^{unto} John my sonne
 twentie pounds to be payd unto him at t[he] end of three yeres lickwise
 after my Deceasse and If ether of them Doe Die by t[he] visittation of
 god my will is t[hat] t[he] portion which I give ^{to keepe} my Children still remayne to the other
 the rest of my goodes my Debts being payd & my finewerill Discharged I
 Doe give unto Annis my wife towarde the breeding up of my Children
 Ite[m] I Doe make my wife An[n]is my whole execut[ri]x Item I Doe Desire
 my brother Thomas Hacker & Henrye Peerce to see this my will full
 filde & kept

In the visitation at Chipping Norton on 28th April 1612 Probate is not proved in the usual way to the Executrix named in the will. Anthony Blincowe granted letters of Administration of the goods of the said deceased because Annis his wife has since deceased.
